### IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Mr. OSMERS introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Education and Labor

# A BILL

To provide a system of scholarships for persons of unusual ability in certain sciences.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 That this Act may be cited as the "Defense Scholarships Act
 of 1955".

5 SEC. 2. As used in this Act—

6 (a) the term "Commissioner" means the United States 7 Commissioner of Education;

8 (b) the term "educational institution" means any pub9 lic or nonprofit tax-exempt junior college, technical institute;
10 college, university, research institution, or other educational

institution which offers education or training at the college or
graduate school level; and

3 (c) the terms "scholarship" and "Defense Scholarship"
4 are synonymous, and mean a scholarship awarded under this
5 Act.

6 SEC. 3. (a) The Commissioner shall, at least annually, 7conduct a competitive examination in each congressional 8 district in each State and in the District of Columbia, Alaska, .9 Hawaii, and Puerto Rico, which shall be open to all citizens 10 of the United States who are residents of the area in which 11 the examination is conducted, and who have completed their 12education through at least the eleventh grade. Each such 13 examination (1) shall be prepared by the Commissioner with a view to determining ability and aptitude in the fields of 14 engineering, physics, chemistry, and other sciences closely 1516 related to engineering, physics, or chemistry; (2) shall be open to all individuals without regard to race, religion,  $17 \cdot$ 18 color, sex, national origin, or ancestry, and (3) shall, 19 insofar as is practicable, be given in each area on the same 20 day. 

21 (b) As soon as is practicable after the date on which 22 such examinations have been given, the Commissioner shall 23 determine the names of the individuals who have passed such 24 examinations. The Commissioner shall notify each individ-25 ual who took an examination what his grade was on the 3

examination, and whether such grade is a passing grade .1  $\mathbf{2}$ or not.

3. (c) After each examination has been conducted, the Commissioner shall determine the names of the individuals 4 5who are eligible for a scholarship as follows:

6 First, he shall determine with respect to each congres-7sional district which is not represented in Congress by a 8 Representative at Large, the names of the four individuals 9 who made the highest grades on such examination, and each 10 such individual shall be eligible for a Defense Scholarship. 11 Second, he shall determine, with respect to each State, 12the names of the individuals who (1) made the highest grade 13on such examination and (2) are not eligible for a scholar-14 ship under the preceding paragraph. Of the individuals  $15^{-1}$ whose names are determined under this paragraph and who 16made the highest grades on such examination, a number 17 equal to four times the number of Representatives at Large and Senators from such State shall be eligible for a Defense 18.19 Scholarship.

20Third, he shall determine, with respect to the District of 21Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico, the names of 22 the two individuals who made the highest grades on such 23examination in each such area, and each such individual <sup>24</sup> shall be eligible for a Defense Scholarship.

Fourth, he shall determine, with respect to all indi-

viduals who took such examination, the names of the four
 hundred individuals who (1) made the higest grades on such
 examination and (2) are not eligible for a scholarship under
 any of the preceding paragraphs, and each such individual
 shall be eligible for a Defense Scholarship.

6 (d) (1) If any individual who is entitled to receive an 7 original award of a scholarship under the first, second, or 8 third paragraphs of subsection (c) does not receive a scholar-9 ship, the individual—

10 (A) who took the same examination in the same
11 area as the individual who did not receive such scholar12 ship;

(B) who is not otherwise eligible under subsection
(c) for a scholarship; and

(C) who made the highest grade on such examination of those made by the individuals in such area who are
not otherwise eligible for a scholarship;
shall be eligible for a Defense Scholarship.

(2) If any individual who is entitled to receive an original award of a scholarship under the fourth paragraph of
subsection (c) does not receive a scholarship, the individual—
(A) who made the highest grade on such examination of all individuals who took such examination; and
(B) who is not otherwise eligible for a scholarship;
shall be eligible for a scholarship.

SEC. 5. (a) The Commissioner shall notify each indi-1 vidual who is eligible for a scholarship, and if such individual  $^{\circ}2$ so elects, he shall be granted a scholarship for study, at the 3 college or graduate level, as may be appropriate, of subjects 4 in the fields of engineering, physics, chemistry, or sciences 5 closely related to engineering, physics, or chemistry. The <sup>-</sup> 6 original award of a scholarship in each case shall be for one 7 academic year, but at the end of such year and at the end · 8 of each succeeding academic year in which such individual 9 has held a scholarship, his scholarship may be renewed for an 10 additional academic year if, in the opinion of the Commis-11 sioner, his academic progress and proposed plan of study 12warrant such renewal. 13

14 (b) Whenever the Commissioner finds that an indi-15 vidual who is receiving a scholarship is failing to maintain 16 satisfactory standards of academic progress, the Commis-17 sioner may suspend the scholarship of such individual, or 18 revoke the scholarship, as circumstances may warrant.

19 SEC. 6. (a) The Commissioner shall from time to time 20 prepare and publish a list of educational institutions approved 21 for attendance by individuals holding scholarships. Approval 22 of an educational institution shall be granted, withdrawn, or 23 withheld, solely on the basis of the educational institution's 24 proficiency in educating its students in scientific courses. 25 (b) Nothing in this Act shall be construed to authorize

the Commissioner or any other officer or employee of the
 United States to exercise any direction, supervision, or con trol over the personnel, administration, curriculum, or pro grams of instruction at any educational institution.

5. SEC. 7. (a) Each individual who holds a scholarship 6 awarded or renewed under this Act may select the educa-7 tional institution at which he will pursue his education from 8 the list of educational institutions approved by the Com-9 missioner.


10 (b) The Commissioner shall pay to the educational 11 institution, for each person holding a scholarship and enrolled 12in that educational institution, the customary cost of tuition, 13and such laboratory, library, health, infirmary; and other 14 similar fees as are customarily charged, and shall pay for 15 books, supplies, equipment, and other necessary expenses (exclusive of board, lodging, other living expenses, and 16  $\cdot 17$ travel), as are generally required for the successful pursuit 18and completion of the course by other students in the educa-19 tional institution; however, in no event shall such payments, 20with respect to any individual, exceed \$1,000 for an academic 21vear.

(c) The Commissioner shall pay to each individual who
holds a scholarship awarded or renewed under this Act a
subsistence allowance, in equal monthly installments, in the
amounts determined under this subsection. The Commis-

1 sioner shall determine the amount of each such monthly  $\mathbf{2}$ installment by determining in advance of the academic year the amount which will be paid with respect to such individual  $\mathbf{3}$ 4 to an educational institution under subsection (b), deducting  $\mathbf{5}$ that amount from \$1,000, and dividing the sum thus obtained 6 by the number of months in the academic year. The Com-7 missioner shall redetermine such amount from time to time, 8 wherever necessary to prevent the total of payments made to, 9 and with respect to, any individual under this subsection and 10 subsection (b) from exceeding \$1,000 with respect to any 11 academic year.

SEC. 8. Each individual who holds a scholarship under this Act shall, so long as he holds such scholarship, be deferred from induction for training and service in the Armed Forces and from training in the National Security Training Corps under the Universal Military Training and Service Act.
