However, the authorizations in the Officer Grade Limitation Act are dependent in part on the ratio of officer to enlisted (including warrant officers): Army 1 to 10.8, Ravy 1 to 9.2, and Air Force 1 to 6.8, or an average of 1 officer to 8.9 enlisted. Applying this ratio to MSA's civilian strength of 6237, we should see early 630 civilian "officers" (GS-8 and above) instead of the 1817 which we now have (see paragraph 1).
- 5. Applying the percentages from paragraph 2 to the "officer" strength arrived at in paragraph 4 (630), comparable numbers of senior civilian positions would be as follows:
