Subject: CIGS_LY Conference

Conference was held on 8 August 1944 in Room N-1100 with the following present:

A number of items relating to the security and operation of the SIGBALY were discussed.

- 2. Kr. Pusch brought with him and turned over to Lt. Summers a record of about 11 minutes of key obtained from the CIGLUSE. This material was requested by it. Summers through Capt. Esswick for use in making security studies.
- 5. For the past year, the Eell telephone laboratories has been making a comprehensive security study of the SiGLTSE. They now feel satisfied as to the security of the equipment. A report is being prepared. a copy of which will be made available to the SSA. In connection with this security study a special machine aid was designed which was capable of recording the output of the DIGLUST and the signal at various points within the machine. It is also capable of making certain computations with respect to the signal. The Poll tulophone laboratories were enticipating disassembling the machine or modifying it for other purposes. However, i.r. Tusch felt that they would probably be willing to sell the machine to the Signal Corps if so desired. Er. Pusch agreed to investigate further the possibility of turning the machine over to the Signal Corps and he will attempt to get an approximate price. It was suggested by Pajor Prehn that Lt. Summ re be sont to the Fell laboratories

to look over the machine and see whether it would be useful to the Ci_ncl Corps in their security study work. He also suggested that Lt. Summers talk to the Fell Laboratories mathematicians concerned in this work. Mr. 'useh Jelt that this would be possible.

- 4. The Bell Laboratories have in their possession two SIDEROL equipments which were built and used by them for training purposes and for security studies. These equipments are Signal Corps property and it is expected that they will be turned over to the Signal Corps about 21 August 1944. Mr. Dusch said that it had been proposed that these equipments to installed at the Tashington DICSAIN terminal for use in training maintenance personnel. If they are badly needed for socurity studies, arrangements could probably to make to have them installed at Arlington Hall instead.
- o. Er. Auch said that of the troubles experienced with the AIG.USA, 80% had been traced to the SIGCUMS. He feels that a tromendous improvement could be obtained in the functioning of the SIGCUM if the SIGCUM troubles could be corrected. He said that, due to these troubles, the use of the SIGCUMAL was restricted to about 10% of calls, the remainder being enciphered using SIGCUMAL. One plan for reducing SIGCUMAL troubles would be to modify the circuit arrangements to use 13 duplicate paths rather than 26 paths now used. This would reduce the frequency of trouble considerably. Hr. Euch feels that the security of the rest of the equipment is sufficient that this change would not reduce the overall security appreciably.
- 6. Of the remaining troubles, Mr. Jusch said that about 60% result from operating errors. He feels that most of these could be eliminated by simplifying the key changes which are now made between contacts. He feels that it is unnecessary to change rotors between contacts and that new rotor settings would be sufficient. Ar. Tusch also feels that the E minutes now allowed between starting the DIJUS. and transmission of the signal is more than is necessary and favors reduction of this time to 5 minutes.
