Matters of the First Meeting held in Paris, December 22nd 1950
All names of the countries are removed. Also Mr. Sicker.

1. Mr. Sicker was stated that as a result of the unfulfilled
expectations of the UNRRA committee members by the British as the re-
disarmament of the Central European "Inc.", etc., it was his opinion that
consideration of the proposed disclosure of the UNRRA should be
made. Specifically, he had spoken with General More during the meeting
of 22 September 1950 and received his permission to discuss the matter
with the Executive Committee and receive their recommendation.

2. Mr. Sicker, explaining his action in this matter, stated
that the UNRRA members had organized "standards and procedures"
known by the British and it was their view that anything
would be gained by the U.S.A. by disclosing the UNRRA to the British
at this time.

3. It was pointed out by Mr. Sicker that the U.S.A. recently engaged
the UNRRA higher division levels, that this action is unsatisfactory and
that the U.S.A. hopes to replace it with France, and as a result would
decide that the UNRRA be made known to the British with an ultimate
view to its use below division levels for continued communication purposes.

4. After thorough discussion of the action the U.S.A. concluded
agreed to recommend to Marshal Stern that the UNRRA not be disclosed
to the British at this time and that Marshal Stern make this recom-
mendation known to the Chief, Army Security Agency for consideration
and recommendation.
