Dear Billy:

I hasten to answer your letter, which arrived while I was on leave in London. I had not written before because I heard you were in hospital, and did not know whether you were well enough to pursue your Pearl Harbour enquiry further.

I have fairly complete evidence from the English records that the Winds
Message (War against U.S. and Britain) was broadcast, but not until after
the attack on Pearl Harbour. Around the end of November we knew what to

further details, I can get them from , or dig up records from PI 86-36/50 USC Ep 3.3(h) (2)
to establish that the Winds Signal was heard at 8 a.m. GMT on
Monday morning 8th December.
As regards Hong-Kong or Singapore. I am still trying to collect
evidence as to when the Winds Message was heard. And I shall write to you
again when I have got all the evidence collated. I have no doubt that the
Winds Message was made, and heard by in Singapore and possibly
in Hong-Kong. I have not yet established the time it was
heard, and my memory that it was before Pearl Harbour may be faulty.
Please let me know if there are any specific points which are not
cleared up in this letter, and whether the real crux of the matter is
whether the Winds Signal was made, or whether it was made before or after
the attack on Pearl.
